

#### From the Pastor's Desk / Del Escritorio del Padre

We all experienced the Joy of the Risen Lord at our Easter celebrations. We had two choices: to deal with it as a routine annual ritual or to turn it into a transforming personal experience.

Walking through the events and sufferings of the Lord on His journey to His glorious Resurrection we could feel His sacrificial love for us. This feeling is not just for those days and moments. It has to have a lasting impact and influence on our lives. That happens when we awaken in us a corresponding love for Him. If our love for Him is genuine we have to reveal it through our daily lives. Our life becomes more disciplined and different from the rest of the world.

We will always be concerned about maintaining our communion with Him and doing what is pleasing to Him. We have to consciously and constantly abstain from the addictive and pervasive influence of the world. The world successfully distracts us from our focus on the Lord through its many enticing programs and entertainment. We tend to yield and feel guilty later. If this continues we will loose interest in our spirituality. That is how devil succeeds and he never rests from tripping us.

The Lord reminded the disciples and us of that trap and required us to pray because we are wrapped in a weak flesh. Prayer helps us to keep alive our communion with the Lord and empowers us to defeat the devil out there. The Lord reminds us "stay awake and pray". Unfortunately we have time for everything else but prayer. We frequently buy into the arguments of the liberal world and do not pray.

For Catholics Individual and family Prayer are unavoidable. Many a time we are like the Israelites influenced and distracted by the pagan culture while in slavery. We spend all our fortunes to establish the worldly standard in our homes and replace prayer with all entertainment. What catholic message do we give to our children? We don't care about their religious upbringing while we do everything for their worldly excellence.

Are we becoming slaves to the liberal world out there and ignore the need to have daily prayers in our homes? Through our daily family prayers we transfer our Catholic heritage to the next generation and help them to experience the uniqueness of catholic spiritual tradition.

If Easter is a personal experience His love should rule our hearts and homes . Our children will proudly hold on to that Catholic tradition.

Si esto continúa perderemos interés en nuestra espiritualidad. Así triunfa el diablo y nunca descansa de hacernos tropezar.

El Señor les recordó a los discípulos ya nosotros de esa trampa y nos pidió que oráramos porque estamos envueltos en una carne débil. La oración nos ayuda a mantener viva nuestra comunión con el Señor y nos da poder para vencer al diablo que está ahí afuera. El Señor nos recuerda "permanezcan despiertos y oren". Si la Pascua es una experiencia personal, Su amor debe gobernar nuestros corazones y hogares. Nuestros hijos se aferrarán con orgullo a esa tradición católica.


Dios los bendiga a todos.

In today's Gospel we hear Jesus say three times, "Peace be with you." This was a common greeting, but the disciples were hiding in fear so they needed reassurance. Jesus gives them that reassurance in three ways: his resurrection, forgiveness of sins, and a blessing for future disciples.

The disciples had seen Jesus crucified and were afraid any of his followers would be treated the same way. So when Jesus appeared to them, he showed them his wounds and let them touch him. He wanted to show them that he was not a ghost; he had risen from death and death has no more power over him. They can now take courage because they will share in the Resurrection themselves. Breathing on them, he bestows the Holy Spirit, source of our courage.

That leads to the second reassurance, forgiveness of sins. Jesus died to take away our sins; now he shares that with his disciples. Anyone troubled by guilt can be forgiven. The disciples themselves probably felt that need, since they had deserted Jesus and one even denied knowing him. He now sends his apostles with the mission to free others from sin. We too can forgive others (and ourselves) knowing that God has forgiven them and us.

Finally, the story of Thomas and his doubts about Jesus' resurrection gives us some hope. Jesus blesses those who "have not seen and have believed" (John 20:29). We usually think the apostles were "more" blessed for having seen and heard Jesus. But Jesus reverses that expectation; we are blessed, even two thousand years after the Resurrection.

#### DIFICULTAD, SUPERVIVENCIA Y GLORIA

En el Apocalipsis, el evangelista Juan nos dice lo que podemos esperar como seguidores de Jesús resucitado: sufrimiento, perseverancia y un reino. Aunque sólo llevamos ocho días de la celebración de nuestra cincuentena pascual, no podemos ignorar la angustia que pesa sobre nuestra vida cotidiana. La resurrección de Jesús no borra el sufrimiento propio, pero su glorioso triunfo sobre la muerte cultiva la resiliencia en nuestros corazones. Recordamos que Jesús no se escatimó a sí mismo, y pedimos por la fortaleza para resistir como él. Imitar a Cristo nos ayuda a crecer como miembros de la familia real de Dios. Como amados ciudadanos del Reino de dios, reconocemos nuestro parentesco con todas las personas. Pedro demuestra su preocupación por los demás al curar a las multitudes de personas rotas y que sufren. En el Evangelio, Tomás acepta su propia curación espiritual cuando Jesús le ayuda a creer. En tiempos de dificultad, supervivencia y gloria, tomemos prestada la declaración de fe de Tomás:

#### PRAYER OF THE WEEK

God of everlasting mercy, who in the very recurrence of the paschal feastkindle the faith of the people you have made your own, increase, we pray, the grace you have bestowed, that all may grasp and rightly understand in what font they have been washed, by whose Spirit they have been reborn, by whose Blood they have been redeemed. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God, for ever and ever.

How can I come to grasp more fully the meaning of my baptism?

#### DIFFICULTY, SURVIVAL, AND GLORY

In Revelation, John the Evangelist tells us what we can expect as followers of the risen Jesus: distress, endurance, and a kingdom. Although we are only eight days into our fifty-day Easter feasting, we cannot ignore the distress weighing down our daily lives. Jesus' resurrection does not erase individual suffering, but his glorious triumph over death cultivates endurance in our hearts. We remember that Jesus did not spare himself, and we ask for the strength to endure as he did. Imitating Christ helps us grow as members of God's royal family. As beloved citizens of the Kingdom of God, we recognize our kinship with all people. Peter demonstrates his care for others as he heals multitudes of broken, suffering people. In the Gospel, Thomas accepts his own spiritual healing when Jesus helps him to believe. In times of difficulty, survival, and glory, we borrow Thomas' declaration of faith: "My Lord and my God!" 
