From the Pastor's Desk / Del Escritorio del Padre

Being truthful is very important in the Catholic Tradition.

The revelation of Truth brings real happiness. It is common knowledge that our opinions and senses often deceive us because we discern very little. Our ignorance of many silly matters will not be held against us at the Judgement Day. Many a time we neglect necessary and spiritually profitable things and waste time with undue concern regarding irrelevant and harmful things. It is true that we have eyes but do not see!

We do not have to worry about any philosophical erudition. One to whom the Eternal Word speaks is free from theorizing. This Word is the source of all knowledge. Without this word no person understands or judges aright. To ease the heart and remain at peace with God one has to trace all things to it and see all things in it. Until we become focused on God we are frequently wearied by many things we hear and read. God is the Truth and we must constantly pray to God to make us one with Him in love everlasting.

The more recollected we become, the simpler our heart is, the easier we understand sublime things because such a person receives knowledge from above. When we do all things for the honor of God we will not be distracted by many labors and will become pure, simple and steadfast. Then the person will enjoy interior peace and will not seek selfish end. Such prudent person knows that uncontrolled desires of the heart will give trouble and affliction. A devout person plans things not according to the whims of evil inclination but according to the right reasons.

Our catholic spiritual tradition encourages us to conquer self, become stronger each day, and advance in virtue. Being truthful is knowing our limits and remaining open to God the Absolute Truth. Every perfection in this life has some imperfection mixed with it. Every learning has some darkness attached to it. Humble knowledge of self is surer path to God than ardent pursuit of learning. We must always prefer a clean conscience and a virtuous life. Mostly people try to become learned rather than live well. We spend lots of time discussing problems whereas to reduce scandals, evil, and laxity in religious organizations, we must focus on uprooting vices and implanting virtues. On the day of Judgement we will be asked not what we have learned but what we have done, not how well we have spoken but how well we have lived. It is very common that famous scholars and personalities are ignored once they are replaced by new hires. Those who considered themselves as something while in office, now they are seldom remembered. The glory of the world is very short lived. Many so called smart people perish because of vain worldly knowledge and too little care for serving God. They are vain in their own conceits because they chose to be great rather than humble. To be great we have to have charity and humility. To be truly wise we have to look at earthly things as folly that we may gain Christ. One who does God's will and renounces one's own is truly very learned, truthful about oneself and oriented to the Absolute Truth, God.

We must promote this virtuous pursuit in our children.

Nuestra ignorancia de muchos asuntos no se tomará en contra de nosotros en el Día del Juicio. Muchas veces descuidamos cosas necesarias y espiritualmente beneficiosas y perdemos tiempo con preocupaciones indebidas por cosas irrelevantes. ¡Es verdad que tenemos ojos pero no vemos!

No tenemos que preocuparnos por ninguna erudición filosófica. Aquel a quien le habla la Palabra Eterna está libre de teorizar. Esta Palabra es la fuente de todo conocimiento. Sin esta palabra nadie entiende ni juzga correctamente. Para aliviar el corazón y permanecer en paz con Dios, uno tiene que seguir todas las cosas y ver todas las cosas en él. Hasta que nos enfocamos en Dios, dejamos de cansarnos por lo que escuchamos y leemos. Dios es la Verdad y debemos orar constantemente a Dios para que nos haga uno con Él en el amor eterno.

Cuanto más recogidos nos volvemos, más sencillo es nuestro corazón, más fácilmente comprendemos las cosas sublimes, porque tal persona recibe conocimiento de lo alto. Cuando hagamos todo para honra de Dios, no nos distraeremos con muchos trabajos y seremos puros, sencillos y firmes. Entonces la persona gozará de paz interior y no buscará fines egoístas. Tal persona prudente sabe que los deseos incontrolados del corazón traerán problemas y aflicción. Una persona devota planea las cosas no de acuerdo con la mala inclinación, sino de acuerdo con las razones correctas.

Nuestra tradición espiritual Católica nos anima a disciplinarnos a nosotros mismos, a fortalecernos cada día y a crecer en la virtud. Ser veraz es conocer nuestros límites y permanecer abiertos a Dios Verdad Absoluta. Cada perfección en esta vida tiene alguna imperfección mezclada con ella. Cada aprendizaje tiene algo de oscuridad adherido a él. El humilde conocimiento de uno mismo es un camino más seguro hacia Dios, que la búsqueda ardiente del saber. Siempre debemos preferir una conciencia limpia y una vida virtuosa. La mayoría de las personas tratan de aprender en lugar de vivir bien. Pasamos mucho tiempo discutiendo problemas para reducir los escándalos, la maldad y la laxitud en las organizaciones religiosas, debemos concentrarnos en desarraigar los vicios e implantar las virtudes. En el día del Juicio no se preguntará lo qué hemos aprendido sino qué hemos hecho, no qué tan bien hemos hablado sino qué tan bien hemos vivido. Es muy común que las personalidades famosas se olviden una vez que son reemplazados por nuevos. Aquellos que se consideraban algo mientras estaban a cargo, ahora no son recordados. La gloria del mundo es de muy corta duración. Muchas personas llamadas inteligentes parecen debido al vano conocimiento mundano y muy poco interés por servir a Dios. Son vanidosos en sus propios conceptos porque eligieron ser grandes en lugar de humildes. Para ser grandes tenemos que tener caridad y humildad. Para ser verdaderamente sabios tenemos que mirar las cosas terrenales como vanas para que podamos ganar a Cristo. El que hace la voluntad de Dios y renuncia a la propia es verdaderamente sabio, veraz sobre sí mismo y mirando a la Verdad Absoluta, Dios.

Debemos promover esta búsqueda virtuosa en nuestros hijos. Dios los bendiga a todos

The Gospel for this feast reminds me of what my aunt used to tell us when we would visit her and share a meal. Her favorite saying was, "If you don't get enough to eat, it's your own fault." Perhaps Jesus would say the same as he feeds us with his Body and Blood.

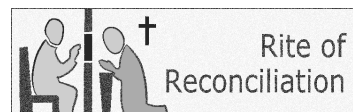

They followed his example by sharing their food also—so much that there were twelve baskets left over.

The miracle of changing bread and wine into his Body and Blood is not just so we can feel good about having Jesus so near to us. It is meant to strengthen us to do our best as his disciples. As food and drink help us to keep on working, his Body and Blood help us to keep on loving.

When the disciples told Jesus about the hungry crowd, he told them, "Give them some food yourselves" (Luke 9:13). And one day they would. When they celebrated the Eucharist after Jesus' resurrection, they gave that spiritual food to the new followers of Christ. We continue that today. EL DON DE LA EUCHARISTÍA

Hoy escuchamos cómo Abraham se encuentra con Melquisedec “rey de Salem... y sacerdote del Dios Altísimo” (Génesis 14:18). Melquisedec no se menciona en otra parte de las Escrituras, pero sin embargo es significativo. El salmo 110 declara del importante rey David: “Tú eres sacerdote para siempre, en la línea de Melquisedec”, una descripción que más adelante se da (en la carta a los hebreos) de Cristo como Sumo Sacerdote.

Los primeros cristianos veían en el pan y el vino de Melquisedec el pan y el vino de la Eucaristía; el relato de Pablo de la Última Cena (en la segunda lectura de hoy) es el más antiguo del Nuevo Testamento. En el Evangelio, Lucas describe a Jesús dando pan a una multitud con palabras similares a las de Pablo, palabras que todavía utiliza la Iglesia: Jesús toma el pan, ofrece palabras de acción de gracias y lo parte. Juntas estas tres lecturas revelan cómo el sacerdocio cristiano, la presencia real de Cristo y la llamada a servir a los pobres y marginados se encuentran en el don de la Eucaristía.

THE GIFT OF THE EUCHARIST

Today we hear how Abram encounters Melchizedek, “king of Salem . . . and a priest of God Most High” (Genesis 14:18). Melchizedek appears nowhere else in scripture, but is nonetheless significant. Psalm 110 declares of the great King David, “You are a priest forever, in the line of Melchizedek,” a description later given (in the letter to the Hebrews) to Christ as High Priest.

Early Christians saw in Melchizedek’s bread and wine the bread and wine of the Eucharist; Paul’s account of the Last Supper (in today’s second reading) is the oldest one in scripture. In the Gospel, Luke describes Jesus providing bread for a crowd in words similar to Paul’s, words still used by the Church: Jesus takes bread, gives thanks, breaks it. Together, these three readings reveal how Christian priesthood, Christ’s Real Presence, and the call to serve those in need are all found in the gift of the Eucharist. Copyright © J. S. Paluch Co.

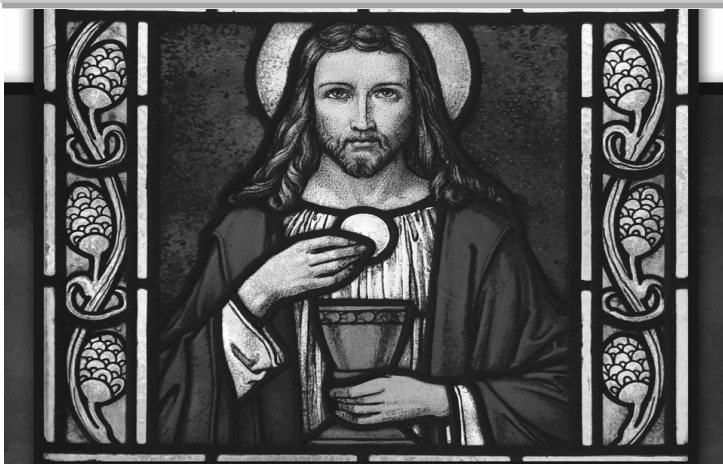
