

From the Pastor's Desk / Del Escritorio del Padre

Month of October is very special in our catholic spiritual tradition. October is specially dedicated to the Rosary devotion. In spite of objections and criticisms on various grounds by many non-Catholic groups, honoring Blessed Mother through various popular devotions and celebrations is unique to us Catholics. It only enhances our attachment to Jesus. Particularly we do not worship Mary but only honor her and seek her intercessory help to follow Jesus seriously and sincerely as she did follow Him in her real life in this world. It is important to remember that during Rosary we meditate on the mysteries surrounding the life of Jesus and logical events connecting with her participation with saving work of Jesus.

As we always remember, tree is known by its fruit, so do we evaluate our devotions whether it brings us closer to Jesus or not. Our slogan is through Mary to Jesus. And we remember her words before His miracle, "do what He tells you".

Why we encourage family rosary?

1. It is a healthy family time. All members are together in an atmosphere of peace and quiet. Hearts will be flooded with God's grace. Loving, caring, giving, forgiving and reconciling spirit will be fostered in their hearts.
2. Marriages become stronger. Parenting is easier. Children become more Respectful and responsible. Positive energy abounds in all minds.
3. Parent child dialogue becomes easier. Kids will have better resistance against the snares of drug, alcohol, pornography, and other addictions promoted by the liberal culture out there.

Additionally the month of October we remember special saints like Francis of Assisi and St Theresa of Avila. Talking about their examples of spiritual life and Christian attitude in life will inspire children to have confidence in the importance of a devotional life that will lead to their salvation. They are only familiar with the fantasy world of social media. It is also a destructive addiction. If we do not develop the spiritual aptitude when they are young, we will lose them when they grow up. We will be guilty before the Lord. May our Blessed Mother and all the saints help us become devout Catholics.

¿Por qué animamos el rosario familiar?

1. Es un momento saludable para la familia. Todos los miembros están juntos en una atmósfera de paz y tranquilidad. Los corazones se inundarán con la gracia de Dios. Se fomentará en sus corazones un espíritu de amor, cuidado, generosidad, perdón y reconciliación.
2. Los matrimonios se fortalecen. La crianza de los hijos es más fácil. Los niños se vuelven más respetuosos y responsables.
3. El diálogo entre padres e hijos se vuelve más fácil. Los niños tendrán una mejor resistencia contra las trampas de las drogas, el alcohol, la pornografía y otras adicciones promovidas por la cultura liberal.

Además, el mes de octubre recordamos a santos especiales como Francisco de Asís y Santa Teresa de Ávila. Hablar de sus ejemplos de vida espiritual y actitud cristiana en la vida inspirará a los niños a tener confianza en la importancia de una vida devocional que los llevará a su salvación. Solo están familiarizados con el mundo de fantasía de las redes sociales. También es una adicción destructiva. Si no desarrollamos la aptitud espiritual cuando son jóvenes, las perderemos cuando crezcan. Seremos culpables ante el Señor. Que nuestra Santísima Madre y todos los santos nos ayuden a ser católicos devotos.

When we were kids, my brothers and sisters and I thought that you were not supposed to say the blessing before meals in a restaurant. We were probably afraid of being embarrassed if non-believers saw us praying. I think of that when I hear St. Paul telling Timothy, "God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather of power and love and self-control" (2 Timothy 1:7). Our readings mention the difficulties that people of faith will encounter, and each reading has its own way of facing those hardships. Jesus gives the practical advice: Look at the difficulties of being a disciple as just part of your job. So if the Lord says I must forgive those who hurt me, or be patient with customers, or share what I have with the poor—no problem; it's part of the job of a disciple. Too tired to go to church after work on a holy day? Just taking care of business.

Paul reminds us in the second reading to stir the gifts of the Spirit into flame. If you take time to pray every day, if you look for God in other people, if you see difficulties as your share of the cross—you will begin to experience those gifts. We can trust that this is more than just wishful thinking by going to the first reading. When the prophet cries out for help with the misery and violence in the world, he hears God's promise that the vision (of hope for deliverance) will be fulfilled even if it seems to be delayed. 

EL DON DE LA FE




