From the Pastor's Desk / Del Escritorio del Padre

There is no limit to what we can talk about how married couples make sacrifices and spiritual practices to safeguard and intensify the sanctity of their marriage and family commitment.

The following reflections are adapted from Saint Pope John Paul second's reflections (Novo milenio inounte) on the seven stages of spirituality.

-The secret of happiness in marriage is the communion of two souls. It requires a lot of sacrifices. Sacrifices are difficult but love makes it easy. Sacrificial love enhances the bliss of joyful communion in marriage. Spouses have to prayerfully reflect every day to recognize how to boost these ingredients in their lives.

-This is easier when we can perceive the presence God in each other. Some times it may be the face of the Risen Lord some times His face on the cross.

Then we look at each other as part of the Mystical Body of Christ . See your brother or sister in the other not an enemy. Christ centered life makes it easy to love the other.

-One must generously join the sufferings of the other Empathy and compassion are inviting into fellowship feelings.

-One must attend to the desires of the other. One reveals oneself through desires. While accepting the desires of the other, the other person feels accepted.

-Each spouse has to offer true and sincere friendship to the other. Half hearted attitude generates alienation. Good or bad one must feel that one can count on the support of the other. One should not have room for suspicion or yield to the temptation to lean on the melting shoulders elsewhere. That tendency is the sign of inadequate commitment.

- One must recognize the positive in the other and frequently express the appreciation for that. Joyfully acknowledges the other person as a blessing from God. Tendency to dwell on the negative destroys the spirit of communion .

- they must make room for each other. Sharing the joys and sorrows energizes sacrificial communion. This will lead to healthy dialogue and bonding communications.

Every day or several times a week spouses should share and shoulder burdens. Thank God for each other and praise God together. Such a sharing and prayerful communion is the secret of successful marriage. Children will learn from parents to stick to that family communion.

That is how loving, sharing, joyful catholic families are.

No hay límite a lo que podemos hablar sobre cómo las parejas casadas hacen sacrificios y prácticas espirituales para salvaguardar e intensificar la santidad de su matrimonio y compromiso familiar.

Las siguientes reflexiones son una adaptación de las reflexiones de San Juan Pablo segundo (Novo milenio inounte) sobre las siete etapas de la espiritualidad.

-El secreto de la felicidad en el matrimonio es la comunión de dos almas. Requiere muchos sacrificios. Los sacrificios son difíciles pero el amor lo hace fácil. El amor sacrificado trae dicha a la comunión gozosa en el matrimonio. Los cónyuges deben reflexionar en oración todos los días para reconocer cómo impulsar estos ingredientes en sus vidas.

-Esto es más fácil cuando podemos percibir la presencia de Dios en los demás. Algunas veces puede ser el rostro del Señor Resucitado, otras veces Su rostro en la cruz. Entonces nos miramos como parte del Cuerpo Místico de Cristo. Ve a tu hermano o hermana en el otro no un enemigo. La vida centrada en Cristo hace que sea fácil amar al otro.

-Uno debe unirse generosamente a los sufrimientos del otro. La empatía y la compasión invitan a los sentimientos de compañerismo.

-Uno debe atender a los deseos del otro. Uno se revela a sí mismo a través de los deseos. Mientras acepta los deseos del otro, la otra persona se siente aceptada.

-Cada cónyuge tiene que ofrecer amistad verdadera y sincera al otro. La actitud a medias genera alienación. Bueno o malo uno debe sentir que uno puede contar con el apoyo del otro. Uno no debe tener lugar para la sospecha o ceder a la tentación de apoyarse en los hombros derretidos en otra parte. Esa tendencia es el signo de un compromiso inadecuado.

- Hay que reconocer lo positivo en el otro y expresar frecuentemente el aprecio por ello. Reconoce gozosamente a la otra persona como una bendición de Dios. La tendencia a detenerse en lo negativo destruye el espíritu de comunión.

- Deben hacerse espacio el uno al otro. Compartir las alegrías y las tristezas. Esto conducirá a un diálogo saludable y comunicaciones vinculantes.

Todos los días o varias veces a la semana, los cónyuges deben compartir y asumir cargas. Agradezcan a Dios el uno por el otro y alaben a Dios juntos. Tal comunión compartida y orante es el secreto de un matrimonio exitoso.

Los niños aprenderán de los padres a adherirse a esa comunión familiar. Así de amorosas, compartidas y alegres son las familias católicas.

Besides being cured, what do Nathan (first reading) and the leper who thanked Jesus (Gospel) have in common?

Both of them began to believe. Nathan proclaims Israel's God to be the only God. The only leper who returned to thank Jesus was "glorifying God in a loud voice" (Luke 17:15). It makes me wonder, what miracles do we see that help us grow in faith?

For an answer, we can look at a second thing they had in common: they both asked for help. Sometimes we get caught up in self-sufficiency mode, thinking we have to handle all our problems by ourselves. We may miss out on ways to solve those problems by not asking for help.

If you think asking for help is a sign of weakness, you may be missing a chance for God to act through one of your friends and give you support. And, of course, you can ask God for help in prayer.

We may have friends who help us in times of need or inspire us with their faith, but we have to decide to make a leap of faith ourselves. The third thing that Nathan and the leper did in common was express their faith. You

can spend your whole life thinking that you are a Christian, but if you never express that faith, it will be just a theory. St. Paul in the second reading, for example, was suffering in prison, but he didn't mind because his suffering demonstrated the importance of Jesus' message to him. So he wrote from prison in the hope that other Christians would be encouraged in their faith. Perhaps you know of someone who inspired you with their faithfulness and dedication. Having a friend who helps us grow in faith can be a very nice miracle indeed.

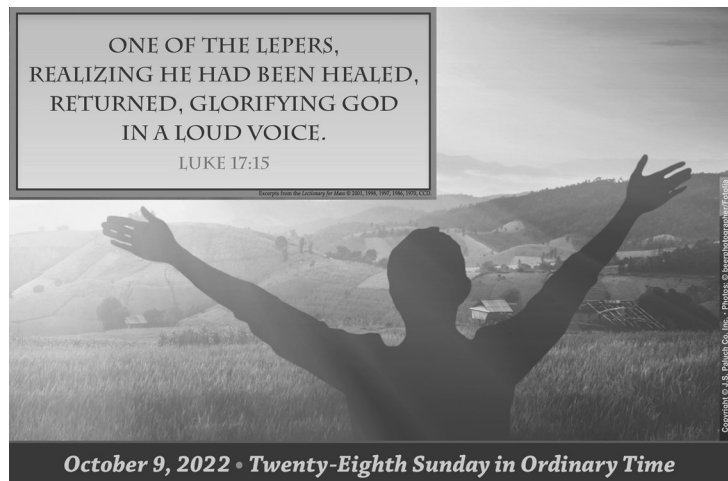

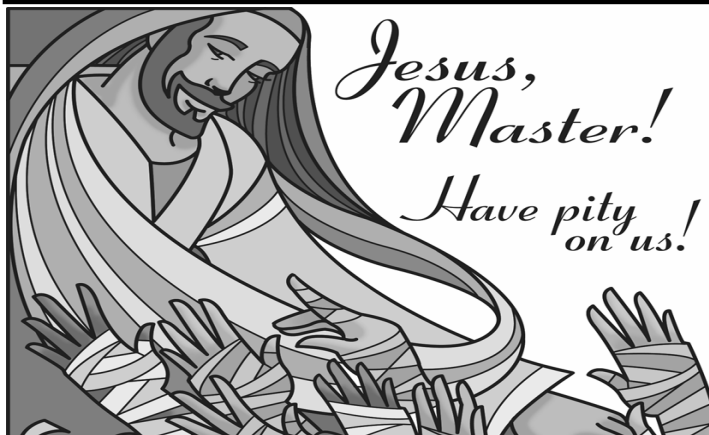

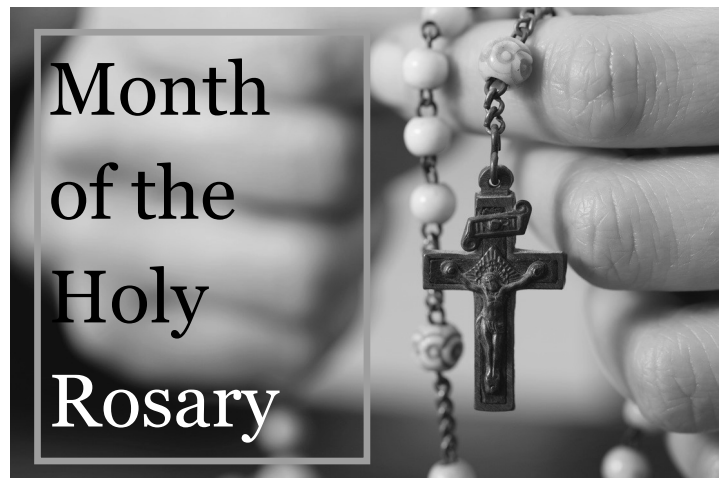

Promises from Our Lady for all those who faithfully pray the Rosary:

1. Whoever shall faithfully serve me by the recitation of the Rosary, shall receive signal graces.
2. I promise my special protection and the greatest graces to all those who shall recite the Rosary.
3. The Rosary shall be a powerful armor against hell, it will destroy vice, decrease sin, and defeat heresies.
4. It will cause virtue and good works to flourish; it will obtain for souls the abundant mercy of God; it will withdraw the hearts of men from the love of the world and its vanities, and will lift them to the desire of eternal things. Oh, that souls would sanctify themselves by this means.
5. The soul which recommends itself to me by the recitation of the Rosary shall not perish.
6. Whoever shall recite the Rosary devoutly, applying himself to the consideration of its sacred mysteries, shall never be conquered and never overwhelmed by misfortune. God will not chastise him in His justice, he shall not perish by an unprovided death; if he be just he shall grow in grace and become worthy of eternal life.
7. Whoever shall have a true devotion for the Rosary shall not die without the sacraments of the Church.

14. All who recite the Rosary are my sons and daughters, brothers and sisters of my only son Jesus Christ.
15. Devotion of my Rosary is a great sign of predestination.



In his encyclical on the Gospel of life, Pope St. John Paul II recognizes the full range of threats against human life, from poverty and malnutrition to murder and war.
